The CEAC is actively seeking the help of a commercial Recycling Company, Greening the Caribbean (GtC), to have Recycling Bins placed in Cap Estate for the Community to use to clean-up our local environment and generally benefit wider ecological objectives. mproving Emergency Responses in Cap Estate is mainly a matter for the private security company, Guardsman, in collaboration with the Gros Islet Police and Storm Security.

During talks with Guardsman, instigated by our Community Safety & Security Sub-committee Leader, Xavier Ribot, it was discovered that the uptake of subscriptions is so low as to permit the provision of just one vehicle for the entire Cap Estate area. Our mission is, therefore, to increase participation in Guardsman's services to allow for a cheaper and

possibly tiered service structure, with more vehicles allocated to Cap Estate for greater coverage, overall security, and faster response times.

Consultation with our local MP, Mr. Montoute, will also be sought to request the dutyfree purchase of Guardsman's vehicles to further reduce the cost of their security services.
